July Member Meeting

On 19 July, Mr Josh Johnson, SAF/AFAOC, presented a demo of DEAMS Data Analytics Power BI. The AFAOC provides customer support through education, SME support, communications, systems operations/monitoring, and data analytics. The AFAOC Data and Analytics team goal is to utilize technology and subject matter expertise to create value for the Air Force. The DEAMS Data Analytics current initiatives include development of data transformation, modeling and delivering user facing analytics leveraging Microsoft Power BI. Mr Johnson stated beyond the teams goal and vision, they want to make sure they leverage subject matter expert, scope complexity, scalability and efficiency. Further they want to be able to take subject matter expertise that's at functional level, accounting knowledge that happens within the ERP or within legacy accounting systems, and be able to apply a technical skill set to that to be able to bring it to the masses. Mr Johnson continued that we want to make sure that it's scalable, since you have too look at all of Air Force accounting which is 30M+ rows between DEAMS and legacy. Mr Johnson said it typically takes 24 to 48 hours to respond to customer requests.

Mr Johnson then spoke about the business intelligence iceberg. In other words leadership sees the result of a presentation chart (i.e., tip of the iceberg) and are able to make a decision, but they didn't see the days of effort that went into to produce (i.e., bottom of the iceberg). In Mr Johnson's words, "when we talk about business intelligence applications, we need to understand what roles each other play in that piece. There's the visualization aspect and then there's the data aspect. And that's the difference that we need to understand." Mr Johnson also spoke to the hurdles they faced; integrating data from multiple systems, data quality, data silos, end user training and low adoption. Mr Johnson discussed how the data analytics Power BI process works. How they collect and extract information from all multitude of systems, visualize (snapshots on what we try and do) and take that siloed data and reproduce it into a unified single source of truth.

Finally Mr Johnson provided a link to the AFAFOC Data Analytics milSuite site (https://www.milsuite.mil/book/groups/afaoc-dataanalytics) which has many training videos on the DEAMS PowerBI reports, and provided a live demonstration of the PowerBI reports and navigation (https://app.mil.powerbigov.us/groups/me/apps/9af7d117-e76f-40a0-a674-f2ee29d46cfb/dashboards/ dcb1c02b-0224-40ef-870e-c331c2f5ed28?ctid=8331b18d-2d87-48ef-a35f-ac8818ebf9b4)

Leadership and the Path to Success

Occupying a leadership position alone does not make you a leader, what **MAKES** a leader is internal drive, heartfelt passion, actions with results, reasonable reactions, and most importantly—effective collaboration. These skills must be sharpened through continuous reflection, self-development/training, and deliberate improvement. During my career, I utilize a set of tenets to create expectations that I embrace:

Performance is Key – No one should know your job better than you, bloom where you are planted, and leave the position better than you found it

Diversify your Abilities – Set yourself apart by mastering multiple functional arenas, take on the hard jobs/ challenges that enable growth and strategies

Track Successes and Failures - Be humble, reflect, and learn from both experiences

Customers are your Priority – Always strive to exceed customer expectations

Ownership – Find "your" work/life balance, develop career goals, seek a mentor, be a mentor and remember; loyalty, trustworthiness, and integrity are what you own, protect it.

UNDERSTAND YOUR MISSION/ROLE:

Absorb yourself in the organization, really understand the ins-and-outs, and know how your job fits into the overall mission. Think of it as a kind of **organizational immersion as** you begin talking with your peers and leadership to gain a holistic picture. Find out what is working, what could use some extra attention, and what leverage do we have or what requires an external focus? Most importantly, early, and often, get to know your people on a deeper level. What motivates them and where are their struggles personally and professionally? A valuable technique in starting the conversation is the **Who**, **What**, **When**, **Where**, **Why a**pproach with the **Why** being the most valuable of all. We are responsible for understanding not only **What** we do, but **Why** we do it across all levels of the organization. Common answers such as, "That's how it's always been done," and, "I'm doing what I've been told," are not acceptable. Encourage everyone to understand the mission they support, their role, and how their work enables the success of the mission.

COLLABORATE AND COMMUNICATE ALWAYS:

Collaborate and communicate both internally and externally. Encourage everyone to create collaborative, crossfunctional, and organizational relationships. A collaborative environment supports a deeper understanding of second and third order effects and eliminates duplication of effort towards a common goal.

OKAY TO FAIL AND TAKE RISK:

Taking risks is scary, especially when it involves a personal endeavor or systemic organizational challenge, but we need to challenge ourselves to promote growth. I contribute my successes and failures both personally and professionally, to the times I have made myself vulnerable, thrown caution to the wind, while accepting the consequences and learning. You should approach each challenge in the shallow end, gather needed information, and slowly work your way to the deep end. Build the foundation of trust and understanding, taking small, deliberate steps to achieve the "quick" wins along the way, rebuilding the blocks for the harder challenges, and working towards "buy-in" on the needed change. This approach will spark your creativity and provide you with opportunities where you exceed your own initial expectations.

Bottom line, leaders are not born, they are developed. That development involves learning from their individual and team's **performance**, getting out of their comfort zone to **diversify** skill sets, evaluating their **successes** and **failures**, continually view the landscape through a **mission/customer lens**, and taking **ownership** of their personal and professional goals

@ Mention in Outlook Emails

@mentions are a useful feature used mostly in Teams. They enable specific users or groups to be called out in a post, so they receive a notification in their Activity Feed. Outlook enables users to use this feature when drafting an email. While typing in the body of the email, type the "@" followed by the user's name in the last name, first name format. For example, typing "@diehl, george", without quotes, would bring up a list of names that match. Selecting the user's name will add a mention of them to the email body. This will also add them to the To box. While this feature may not be very useful for formal emails, it can enable users to rapidly send an informal email to one or more recipients.

Easily Resend Email in Outlook

In Outlook, you can easily send a previously sent or received email to another person exactly as it was originally sent or received. Resending an email is slightly different than forwarding an email as it opens the email in more of a ready-tosend mode. The message will not have the normal header information that includes From, To, Subject, etc. you see forward an email. To do this, click on the "Tell me what you want to do" box in the ribbon and type "resend". A dropdown labeled "More Move Actions" will appear. Click on it and select the "Resend this message" option. Doing so will open the email, as it was received, ready to be sent to a new recipient.

Create Custom Keyboard Shortcuts in Word

In Word, you can create your own keyboard shortcuts. The easiest way to access this feature is to right-click anywhere in the Word ribbon and select the "customize the ribbon" option. The Word Options window will open to the Customize Ribbon section. In this section there will be two lists of commands and tabs. Below the list of commands, the list on the left, is a "Keyboard shortcuts:" Customize button. Click on this button to open the Customize Keyboard window.

This window has a box of command Categories, Commands, and Current keys. Navigate the categories to find the specific command you would like to create a shortcut for. Once you select a specific command, click in the "Press new shortcut key" box and press the shortcut you would like to use. The Current keys box displays any existing shortcuts for the selected command and the "Currently assigned to" list appears if you use a shortcut that is already assigned such as Ctrl+C.

As a side note, this is also an excellent way to find keyboard shortcuts for commands you use regularly.

Teams App Keyboard Shortcuts

Note that a few shortcuts are a little different when using a web browser and will be shown in brackets.

Ctrl+. Opens a list of keyboard shortcuts (i.e., a shortcut to shortcuts)
Ctrl+, to open the settings window
Ctrl+E starts a search (type "/" in the Search bar to view a list of advanced commands)
Ctrl+F starts a section specific search
Ctrl+N opens a new chat [does not work in web browser]
Ctrl+1 opens the Activity Pane [Ctrl+Shift+1 in web browser]
Ctrl+2 opens the Chat Pane [Ctrl+Shift+2 in web browser]
Ctrl+3 opens the Teams Pane [Ctrl+Shift+3 in web browser]
Ctrl+4 opens the Calendar Pane [Ctrl+Shift+4 in web browser]
Ctrl+G opens the GoTo command for jumping straight to a team or channel [Ctrl+Shift+G in web browser]
